Ariana Grande attends Billboard's 13th Annual Women in Music Event at Pier 36 on Dec. 6, 2018 in New York City. Downtown NYC's SubCulture performing arts venue will be hosting Tony Award-winning composer and lyricist Jason Robert Brown's Artist-in-Residency concert virtually this month.

From the comfort of their homes, Brown will welcome his longtime band for a special performance, plus guest appearances by <u>Ariana Grande</u> and Shoshana Bean. Grande made her Broadway debut in Brown's 2008 musical *13*.

"What I have missed and mourned the most over these last extraordinary weeks has been my ability to connect with music – to play and sing with other musicians, and to feel the audience responding," Brown said in a statement. "Every month for the past five years, I've been able to do just that at SubCulture, working with the best musicians and singers I know to make music together for a smart, involved and joyful audience in a place that's come to feel like a second home."

"Sitting here watching the news go by, I had to do something, I had to figure out some way to let these notes and words in my head come out and be shared with my collaborators and my audience, and so, here we are," he continued. "All of us in our homes, making music however and whenever we can, with an amazing team to help pull it all together, and two of the greatest singers on the planet



Livestream will benefit the staff and musicians at famed Manhattan venue SubCulture

<u>Ariana Grande</u> and <u>Broadway</u> star Shoshana Bean (*Hairspray*) will join composer Jason Robert Brown (*The Last Five Years*, *13*) for a special virtual concert to benefit the staff and musicians from famed Manhattan venue SubCulture. The intimate theater is currently shut down due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The show will take place on Monday April 27th at 8 p.m. EST, livestreaming via both <u>SubCulture's</u> <u>Facebook page</u> and Brown's <u>Vimeo channel</u>. A <u>page for donations</u> to benefit the venue's staff is already live. "What I have missed and mourned the most over these last extraordinary weeks has been my ability to connect with music — to play and sing with other musicians, and to feel the audience responding," Brown said in a statement.

Brown's virtual show will take the place of his monthly Artist-in-Residency appearance at SubCulture. Ariana Grande Is Singing With Jason Robert Brown and We Have Demands

After recently performing as both Meg and the Muses in Hercules (all while not standing up, incredibly on brand for her), Ariana Grande is further embracing her truest musical-theater self and accompanying Jason Robert Brown (remotely) for one of his SubCulture series concerts on April 27. They'll be joined by Shoshana Bean, beltress extraordinaire, and the concert will support the venue's staff and musicians. This is some very exciting news for musical-theater nerds of a certain stripe, so of course we had to convene here for a very important emergency Vulture conversation.

Jackson McHenry: First of all, I'm thrilled that 13 the Musical, Ari's Broadway debut alongside <u>The Good Wife's Zach Florrick</u>, is back in pop-culture relevance, but this has also precipitated what we can only describe as a deep emotional crisis for those of us theater nerds employed in Vulture. Madison, my first question, how are you reacting right now?

Madison Malone Kircher: This is the closest I've ever come to believing *The Secret* actually works. I made a dumb joke to Jason Robert Brown on a Broadway red carpet last year after they had just announced that <u>13 was getting a Netflix adaptation</u> about how I was trying to manifest an Ariana Grande reunion with Brown for the film and, well, here we are. So I'm extremely calm, thank you for asking.

JM: Personally I screamed, "Ari, sing 'All the Wasted Time!" when I first saw this email, because of course, like any reasonable person, I'm trying to get a revival of *Parade* going.

MMK: Yes, but also I would need to hear her do it twice. Once as herself and once doing her best Carolee Carmello impression, a skill you just *know* she has on lock.

JM: AWLLL THE WAHSTEEED TAAAIME.

MMK: [Whisper riffs] AAAHHHH THE WAY-STEhhhh HOOOOOoooooOOOUUUU! Yes, this is the line without most of its consonants.

JM: Shoutout, I have to add, to our friend Esther Zuckerman who <u>has also been</u> trying to will this specific Ariana Grande–JRB collaboration into existence. In addition to *Parade*, I feel like we'd have to see her dip into some <u>Last Five Years</u>? Maybe go full Kelli O'Hara and try some upper register *Bridges of Madison County*? There is of course <u>"Jason's Song,"</u> the song that Jason Robert Brown actually wrote for Ariana Grande, but that's not really the full *musical-theater drama* I need in this moment.

MMK: I feel like this is the perfect moment for Ari and Shoshana to duet "<u>The Next Ten Minutes</u>," the queer *The Last Five Years* of my lesbian dreams. Ooooh, *ooooh* or maybe Ariana should do "<u>It All Fades Away</u>" from *Bridge*. I'd like to hear what she'd do with those truly never-endings "ahhhhhhhs."

JM: The thought of a Shoshana-Ari duet is bringing me nearly as much excitement as the Erivo-Bean "When You Believe," so I'm of course now also willing that to happen. *Bridges*-wise, I'd love it for either of them to do "Another Life" — Shoshana's is excellent, and Grande could do some interesting stuff with the restraint of the song there, even if restraint isn't her typical deal.

MMK: Is it incredibly basic theater girl of me to say I'd also really love to hear a Grande take on "Stars and the Moon"? Because if the answer is yes, then so be it. I'd really love to hear it. If you think about "Stars and the Moon," all those men, you might say, taught her love, patience, and pain.

JM: Thank U, stars and the moon and the open highway, and the river beneath UR feet. I also feel strongly, seasonally appropriate or not, that Ari has practiced a version of "Surabaya-Santa" in full costume. Would also be thrilled to see Shoshana re-create her Encores! performance of said song.

MMK: Okay, so this is all going down on Monday, April 27 at 8. Which gives everyone plenty of time to watch (or rewatch) the featurette on YouTube about the recording of the *13* cast album. Baby Ari! Baby Graham Phillips! Baby that girl who was on a childhood sports team with me but we all didn't quite understand that "doing acting" meant she was literally on Broadway! Consider this your homework.

The Mon., April 27 livestream show will feature both powerhouse vocalists performing from their homes with Broadway composer and SubCulture concert curator Jason Robert Brown

On Mon., April 27, GRAMMY-winning pop songstress <u>Ariana Grande</u> and Broadway musical star <u>Shoshana Bean</u> will treat fans to a special livestream concert for the SubCulture Residency Concert, to benefit the currently out-of-work staff and musicians from the beloved N.Y.C. venue.

The event of <u>theater nerd dreams</u> is led by musical composer and SubCulture Artist-in-Residency concert curator <u>Iason Robert Brown</u>. He will perform with the two powerhouse vocalists/performers—all from the comfort of their homes, of course.

"I had to figure out some way to let these notes and words in my head come out and be shared with my collaborators and my audience, and so, here we are," Brown said in a statement.

"All of us in our homes, making music however and whenever we can, with an amazing team to help pull it all together, and two of the greatest singers on the planet Earth: the patron saint of the SubCulture Residency, Shoshana Bean, and GRAMMY-winner, icon and total theater nerd Ariana Grande. We've put together a show about what we've lost, what we've discovered and what we're grateful for, and I can't wait to share it with you."

Back in 2008, Grande worked with Brown on "13," her Broadway and professional debut, at age 15. The "thank u, next" singer more recently showed of her musical theater chops in NBC's "Hairspray Live!" in YEAR. At the 2020 GRAMMY Awards, she served up a sultry, pink-hued medley of "My Favorite Things," "7 rings," which interpolates the Rodgers and Hammerstein-classic, and "thank u, next." The year prior, at the 61st GRAMMY Awards, she won her first golden gramophone; Best Pop Vocal Album for 2018's Sweetener.

Up until 2006, Bean sang her heart out in lead roles in Broadway's "Wicked," "Hairspray," "Funny Girl" and more, and recently returned to the spotlight after time away, with the lead role in the beloved <u>Sara Bareilles</u>-scored musical "Waitress." Tomorrow, April 23, she will perform during the "<u>Stonewall Gives Back!</u>" livestream concert to celebrate and support the LGBTQ+ community during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The livestream concert series is free to watch, but viewers are encouraged to **donate to their fund** to assist the SubCulture staff and musicians. It will be streaming on SubCulture's **Facebook page** and **Vimeo** at 5:00 p.m. ET on Mon. April 27.

Ariana Grande is joining forces with <u>Shoshana Bean</u> for Jason Robert Brown's monthly Artist-in-Residency concert. SubCulture will present the virtual evening of music on April 27 at 8PM ET. This special concert will be free to watch, but viewers are encouraged to <u>donate</u> to assist the SubCulture staff and musicians. The concert will be available via SubCulture's <u>Facebook</u> page and on <u>Vimeo</u>.

Grande, who appeared in Brown's 13 on Broadway in 2008, earned a 2019 Grammy Award for Best Pop Vocal Album for her chart-topping record Sweetener. Sshe played Tracy Turnblad's gum-popping best friend Penny Pingleton in NBC's Hairspray Live! and reunited with Brown for her single "Dangerous Woman" at the MTV Movie Awards. She has appeared on screen in Scream Queens, Victorious and Saturday Night Live.

concluded her run as Elphaba in *Wicked*. Her other stage credits include *Hairspray*, *Godspell*, *Funny Girl* and Brown's *Songs for a New World*.

The monthly residency resumes online April 27.

Though Jason Robert Brown's artistic residency at downtown's SubCulture has been put on hold due to shutdowns from coronavirus concerns, the Tony Award-winning composer-lyricist, along with SubCulture co-founder Marc Kaplan, will present the April engagement as a free virtual concert April 27 at 8PM ET. Brown will welcome (from their homes) his longtime band, plus special guests Ariana Grande and **Shoshana Bean**.

Grande and Brown have been close ever since Grande made her Broadway debut in Brown's musical 13 (prior to her pop stardom). Over the years, the pair have maintained a friendship; Brown wrote the tribute to Grande when she was named one of Time's 100 Most Influential People in 2016. Bean, whose first concert with Brown at SubCulture inspired the idea for the ongoing residency, returns for the fifth time.

The digital event marks the 58th concert of the residency, which has also included the special fundraiser presentations of *The Last Five Years* starring **Joshua Henry** and **Cynthia Erivo** and **Jason Robert Brown** with Stephen Sondheim—both at Town Hall and both fundraisers for the Brady Campaign to end gun violence.

The April 27 concert is free and available on <u>Vimeo Live Stream</u> as well as <u>SubCulture's Facebook</u> <u>Page</u>, but Brown encourages <u>donations to the SubCulture Relief Fund</u> to sustain the venue, its staff, and musicians through the shutdown.

She teamed with Jason Robert Brown's SubCulture for the song from "The Last Five Years."

Ariana Grande was back on Broadway on Monday night (April 27). Well, virtually anyway. The singer joined Jason Robert Brown's Virtual SubCulture Artist-in-Residency concert series for a three-hanky cover of the opening ballad "Still Hurting" from Brown's 2001 *The Last Five Years* musical. Grande, who got her start in 2008 in one of Brown's earlier musicals, 13, sang her stunning vocals in front of a professional mic set-up from an undisclosed location, while Brown accompanied her remotely on piano, along with other dialed-in musicians adding strings and guitar.


